

A Report to Friends


2022 has been eventful to say the least with Putin's full-blown attack on neighboring Ukraine resulting in horrors not seen in Europe since World War II. Moldova World Children's Fund (MWCF) has been sounding the alarm of the eventuality of this invasion for the past eight years. Correspondingly, we broadened the scope of our capacity for a focused and rapid response...maximizing preparations to the extent limited financial and personnel resources allowed.

When the Russian onslaught began in earnest on February 24th, MWCF volunteer Vice President for Moldova Operations John Maxemchuk and in-country manager and chief implementor Irina Rusanovschi immediately increased their work mode to 16 hours per day, 7 days a week. We quickly found our niche between big, deep pocketed, humanitarian aid organizations and governments, large and small, on one hand, and the humbling hospitality of relatively poor Moldova on the other...as more than 3 out of 4 Ukraine refugees were welcomed into private homes across the country. Due to its size, Moldova began taking in per capita approximately three times as many refugees as any other country.

We chose a route of first recognizing essential needs, and then providing functional models for both immediate and longer term response.

This year's Report to Friends is (1) a heartfelt thank you to our growing number of donors and logistical partners for their outpouring of sacrificial gifts, (2) a grateful tribute to our productive, hardworking team 'in harms way' on the

> ground in and around Moldova, and (3) a recap of resulting projects which have dominated MWCF's 2022...implementing timely solutions, realistic within our capabilities, while providing actualized blueprints in helping ongoing efforts of others. Urgent crisis response and intuitively practical projects continue to keep us busy.

An existing good relationship with the Ukraine Embassy in Moldova quickly grew into a multi-faceted, and throroughly trusting, partnership. Ukraine Ambassador Marko Shevcenko, his ever-present wife Olesia. and their embassy's First Secretary Ihor Melnychuk have been working at a blistering

pace around the clock...rolling up their sleeves, getting down in the trenches, and enabling us to maximize our combined efforts.





Romania colleague Razvan Anca has been tireless in scouring the industrial areas in and around Bucharest obtaining provisions and gear in bulk at good prices, coordinating transportation, and lending a helping hand wherever needs have arisen.







High nutrition food bars and canned food with liftoff lids have proven to be ideal...easy to carry, ready to eat, with no need to refrigerate or cook. Purchased by large truckloads outside Bucharest, Romania, then transferred from MWCF storage facilities in Moldova to smaller Ukrainian vehicles for delivery into war-torn Ukraine. Sleeping bags for the poorly equipped have been critically important...especially to avoid frost bite during the cold nights of winter. Beginning in early April while Russian forces were still attempting to encircle the capital city Kyiv, we have been slipping an average of one truck per week into the capital and other locations inside Ukraine.

Mobility across the board has been a key ingredient for these MWCF projects... creating the ability to quickly move functional infrastructure in any direction








Mobile solar powered electrical energy systems procured and installed... donated by Footprint Project of Minneapolis, Minnesota in March...becoming more vital with each passing winter day and every new Russian assault on civilian infrastructure. We hope to continue acquiring various types of electrical generators as additional gifts are received.









30 stand alone satellite communication systems donated by SpaceX and widely positioned throughout the country...including one at the Ukraine Embassy to Moldova in Chisinau...all surviving an explosive fire in our main storage facility







Refurbished ambulance and wheelchair donations...truckloads of antibiotics, painkillers, and other pharmaceuticals compliments of Momentum Solutions and Direct Relief mostly trucked directly into Ukraine from The Netherlands



In collaboration with international charity Smart Aid and other supporters, eight classrooms are in the works at Moldovan schools... equipped with notebook computers, headphones, and stable internet connections allowing Ukrainian refugee children to continue their

education. Via uploads from the Ukrainian Ministry of Education the children are able to participate in coordinated online classes.

The best thing we can do for the children is help the war end on a relatively positive note as soon as possible.



Humanitarian assistance comes in many forms. Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) gear for demining and disarming unexploded bombs for the National Police of Ukraine, were provided by members of the Western North Carolina Chapter of Military Officers Association of America (MOAA)...through MWCF...couriered into Kyiv during the summer.

From what we have been able to surmise, 9 out of 10 places targeted by Russian forces continue to be civilian, not military positions.

He has helped manage multibillion dollar defense programs and to provide civilian communities with medical, sanitation and education infrastructure. Sergio retired from the military in August 2022 and is transitioning into the international development sector. Sergio and wife Alejandra support a nursing home in Guatemala and have been generous donors to MWCF's general fund since 2013.

The 2022 MWCF annual board weekend was held in November at the Washington, DC home of former U.S. Ambassador to Moldova Michael Kirby and his wife Sara. The business session included the election of members and officers. 2021 financials reported 98% of expenses to program, with only 2% for salaries, benefits, administration, and fundraising combined. Evening events were devoted to expressing appreciation to donors...led by Moldova's new Ambassador to the United States Viorel Ursu.
